## Call for Papers

The *European History Section* of the Southern Historical Association invites proposals for individual papers and complete panels for presentation at its annual meeting in Baltimore, Maryland, October 27-30, 2011.

Papers on any aspect of European history, covering any time period, are welcome. The program committee especially encourages proposals involving comparative history, such as Europe and the Americas, Europe and Britain, Europe and Africa, or Europe and Asia.

Panels should consist of two or three papers, a commentator, and a chair. Graduate students, as well as faculty members and independent scholars are welcome to submit individual papers or panels. A panel should not consist exclusively of graduate students and should avoid having doctoral advisors serve as commentators if their graduate students are on the same panel. All papers read are eligible for the Amos E. Simpson award.

Submissions should include a one-page description of each paper and a short (1-2 page) c.v. of each panelist. In the case of panels, please include the title of the panel and a short description of the topic and its rationale as a panel. Proposals are due by September 7, 2010.

## **Minutes of the Annual Meeting of European History Section Executive Committee, Thursday, November 5, 2009 in Louisville, KY, 4:30 PM, Grandstand, the Marriott Louisville Downtown Hotel**

The meeting opened at 4:40 pm. Present were James Tent, Kathy Kennedy, David Redles, Wayne Bowen, Barbara Schnorrenberg, David Hendon, Wendy Koenig, Alice-Catherine Carls, and Joanne Rao Sanchez. Robert Crout joined the meeting around 5:45 pm.

### **I. Reports of the Officers of the Section**

Vice Chair Katharine Kennedy presented her slate of officers for 2011 and 2012. The motion was seconded by David Redles and approved unanimously. The 2012 officers are: Program, Eric Kurlander (13 St.Louis); Nominating (12), Nancy Rupprecht; Membership (12), Jerry Gaw; Baker Burton Smith (12), Hermann Beck; Parker Schmitt Simpson (12), Jim Albisetti; Parker Schmitt Simpson (11), Jeff Burson; Snell (12), Patricia Kollander. Katharine Kennedy also announced that Jim Albisetti will be the 2010 Business Luncheon Speaker. She also announced the 2009 EHS Reception, Friday November 6, 5:30 - 7:00PM at the University of Louisville's Faculty Club.

Secretary-Treasurer Alice-Catherine Carls presented her reports. The Section's finances are in good shape, showing surpluses in four categories (gifts, income, total assets, and dues receipts). The total combined assets of

the Section as of October 31, 2009, were \$ 7,805.65. Membership remained flat, with a total of 126 affiliates, of whom 26 were Life members. Total membership for 2009 was at 179. The Section lost 6 regular members and 2 student members, but gained 7 Kele Award members and 16 new members. Alice-Catherine Carls expressed her regret that the Membership Committee did not work well this year and thanked James Tent for picking up these responsibilities and sending a mailing in the spring to all European historians listed in the AHA Directory. Joanne Rao Sanchez commented that the SHA wants the EHS Membership Committee Chair to attend the SHA Membership Committee meetings. She suggested that we encourage Kele Memberships and enforce the membership rule for all presenters (the SHA passed a resolution to this effect this year). Nupur Chaudhuri suggested targeting department chairs to ask them to encourage their dept members to attend and join.

Managing Editor of the "Newsletter" David Hendon reported that things are going well. He distributed 150 electronic copies and sent 30 hard copies only. David expressed the wish to be relieved of his responsibilities after publishing the Fall 2010 issue. The Executive Committee agreed that this is one of the most important tasks of the Section. Discussion ensued about what to do with past Newsletters. Some of them will have to be archived. Alice-Catherine Carls and David Hendon will correspond about this.

Section Chair James Tent expressed a major concern about the lack of functioning of the Membership Committee. We need a functioning committee with dynamic chair. He reported on his initiative to compile a list of prospective members and send 637 emails in the spring.

SHA Executive Council Representative Joanne Rao Sanchez stressed the need to focus on membership. The SHA lost 300 members in 2009. They also had a deficit, which they made up by revenues from J-STOR. The next step would be to establish a presence on Facebook. She reminded David Hendon to send to John Boles the list of 2010 EHS officers and 2009 EHS award winners. She reminded the EHS to send to SHA the name of the next EHS representative to SHA. Future meeting sites for the annual SHA meetings are, 2015, Little Rock; and 2016, the Tradeswind Resort in St. Petersburg, FL. Joanne reported that she invited the members of SHA Executive Council to the Reception and told them about the Business Luncheon program. The LACS luncheon is at the same time on Saturday noon.

The Enno E. Kraehe Distinguished Service Award was discussed. Katharine will notify the 2010 winner. Alice-Catherine Carls was briefly excused from the meeting.

Standing Committee Chairs' reports were given. On behalf of Amanda Aucoin (Nominating Committee), Barbara Schnorrenberg presented the name of Joel Dark as 2010 Vice Chair; and of Bob Billinger as EHS Representative to SHA Council, with his term starting at the conclusion of the 2010 Annual SHA meeting (2011-2023). James Tent, on behalf of the Membership Committee, stated that he will work with the new Membership Committee. Alice-Catherine Carls on behalf of Jeffrey R. Smith of the Snell Prize Committee announced the winner of the 2009 Prize as Paula de la Cruz-Fernandez of Florida International University, writing in Professor Aurora Morcillo's class in the Ph.D. program. Her paper was entitled "The Cultural of Sewing in Spain: A Cultural Approach to the Shaping of Spanish Ideology of Domesticity." She reported that Ms. Fernandez would not be able to attend the luncheon, and that she had sent her a certificate, check, and congratulatory letter. Nupur Chaudhuri reported on behalf of Astrid Eckert about the two Simpson Prizes. The 2008-2009 prize was given to Jeffrey D. Burson for his paper, "Flirting and Philandering around the Boundaries of Lay and Catholic Enlightenment: The *abbés* of Paris during the Century of Lights." The 2009 winner is Michael J. Mulvey for his paper, "What is so Funny about Rabbi Jacob? *Les aventures de rabbi Jacob* (1973) and the Politics of French Cinematic Comedy." Wendy Koenig of the Baker-Burton-Smith Prize Committee reported the winner of the 2009 Baker Burton Prize as Warren Rosenblum, for his book *Beyond the Prison Gates: Punishment and Welfare in Germany, 1850-1933*, published by the University of North Carolina Press in 2008.

The Program Committee Chairs gave their reports. David Redles (09 Louisville) reported that all is well, but that the Sunday morning panel may be cancelled because none of the presenters had sent in their papers or

reported for the session. Wayne Bowen (10 Charlotte) said that he had a good program, and planned to attend the Friday meeting of the SHA Program Committee. Rebecca Boehling (11 Baltimore) was not present.

There was no old business. Among items of new business, Dr. Nupur Chaudhuri was introduced as the new Secretary Treasurer starting her term at the conclusion of the SHA 2009 meeting. The transition was briefly discussed, with meeting being planned to introduce Dr. Chaudhuri to SHA and to start the transition process. It was agreed to send the name of Bob Billinger forward to SHA for their approval. Alice-Catherine Carls recommended that the responsibilities of thanking outgoing committee chairs and training new chairs be shifted from the Secretary Treasurer to the Vice-Chair, in order to lighten the workload of the Secretary Treasurer and to insure a greater continuity in the work of the committees. This new arrangement was agreed upon and will start at the conclusion of the 2009 SHA Annual Meeting.

The meeting adjourned at 6:15PM.

**Robert Blobaum** West Virginia University reports that in 2009 Collegium Civitas, the University of Tartu, and West Virginia University began their collaborative Transatlantic MA Program in East-Central Europe Studies as part of the U.S.-EU Atlantis project. The Atlantis program is administered and funded by the Fund for the Improvement of Education and the European Commission's Directorate for Education and Culture. **Rebecca Boehling** of the University of Maryland at Baltimore County has been promoted to Director of the Dresher Center for the Humanities at that university.

**D.R. Dorondo** of Western Carolina University just now is engaged in an attempt to establish an on-line community (and perhaps something more substantial later) of historians interested in the study of the horse-mounted warrior. It will be called the Cavalry Studies Group.

**Annette Finley-Croswhite** of Old Dominion University and Gayle Brunelle of California State University at Fullerton have published a book together. *Murder in the Métro* deals with the murder of Laetitia Toureaux, who had infiltrated a pro-fascist group called the Comité d'Action Révolutionnaire. It will be available from LSU Press in May.

**Eliza Glaze** of Coastal Carolina University was awarded a National Humanities Center sabbatical fellowship for the academic year 2010/11. She will use it to complete a book on medical history in southern Italy during the eleventh and twelfth centuries to be entitled *Gariopontus and the Saleritans: the 'Passionarius' and Medical Practice in Southern Italy 1000-1200*. The National Humanities Center is a private nonprofit institution located in Research Triangle Park, North Carolina.

**Boris Gorschkov** of Auburn University published a book *Russia's Factory Children: State, Society, and Law, 1800-1917* with University of Pittsburgh Press last year and wrote an essay "Teaching Modern Russian History in European and Global Context" for *NewsNet: News of the American Association for the Advancement of Slavic Studies* (vol. 49, no. 2, March) also last year.

**Christine Haynes** of the University of North Carolina-Charlotte published a book, *Lost Illusions: The Politics of Publishing in Nineteenth-Century France* (Harvard University Press, 2010).

**Dale Hoak**, Chancellor Professor Emeritus at the College of William and Mary, published two articles: "The King's Great Matter," in *Vivat Rex! **Aaron Horton** is now teaching at the University of Arkansas at Little Rock.

**Jeffrey H. Jackson** of Rhodes College has published *Paris Under Water: How the City of Light Survived the Great Flood of 1910* (Palgrave Macmillan, 2010) which tells the largely-forgotten story of the worst disaster in Paris in the modern age. The book has been reviewed in *The New York Times*, *Washington Post*, and *London Review of Books*. **Sharon A Kowalsky**, Texas A&M University-Commerce, published *Deviant Women: Female Crime and Criminology in Revolutionary Russia, 1880-1930* (Northern Illinois University Press, 2009).

**Brian Maxson** of East Tennessee State University published two articles, "Leonardo Bruni's Hiero in Early Renaissance Florence" and "The Many Shades of Praise: Diversity in Epideictic Rhetoric in Diplomatic Settings." The latter article is an extended version of a talk he delivered in Munich, Germany, for the conference "Diversitat und Rhetorik im Mittelalter und Renaissance." He also won a large internal grant from the Office of Research and Sponsored Programs at East Tennessee State University to spend the spring semester in Florence, Italy. In Florence, Brian is enjoying Italian coffee and ice cream in addition to striving to complete the research and writing of his monograph tentatively titled *Costumed Words: Humanism in Practice in Fifteenth-Century Florence*.

**George E. Munro** of Virginia Commonwealth University) recently published *The Most Intentional City: St. Petersburg in the Reign of Catherine the Great* (Fairleigh Dickinson University Press, 2008).

### **Cavalry Studies Group Seeking Members**

Historians interested in the study of mounted warfare and the history of the military horse are encouraged to contact Dr. David R. Dorondo at Western Carolina University for the purpose of establishing a Cavalry Studies Group (CSG). At least initially, the CSG will comprise a virtual community of both professional scholars and amateur historians for the purpose of regular exchange of views and research. It is hoped that a real-world association might eventually result. Unlike two other already well-established organizations – the US Cavalry Association and the Society of the Military Horse – the CSG will not be limited primarily to American military history (USCA) nor will participation be by invitation only (SMH). Thematically, the CSG will place particular emphasis on the history of mounted warfare in Europe and Central Asia, though all eras and locations will be open.
