SNELL PRIZE IN EUROPEAN HISTORY OF THE SOUTHERN HISTORICAL ASSOCIATION For GRADUATE STUDENT PAPERS

This award is given annually to the graduate student with the best seminar research paper in European history. The Prize winner will be honored at the annual meeting of the Section in October 2008. The award carries a stipend of \$150. The Snell Award winner also receives one free year of student membership in the European History Section of the Southern Historical Association.

Rules are as follows:

1. Only resident graduate students in Southern universities and colleges are eligible to compete. (For the purposes of this competition, "Southern" will be defined as extending from Maryland to Texas)
2. Only papers written during the academic year immediately preceding the granting of the award, including summer 2007, are acceptable. The supervising faculty member or adviser who must also endorse the submission must attest this fact.

3. The competition is open only to seminar papers, the length of which shall not exceed 50 pages (endnotes and bibliography do not count toward this limit). Seminar papers may be related to prospective theses or dissertations.

4. Contestants must submit three copies of their papers, sending one copy to each member of the committee. Manuscripts must be typed, double-spaced, and include a bibliography and the customary documentation. If contestants wish to have copies returned, they must include stamped, self-addressed envelopes. A letter of endorsement from the supervising faculty member or adviser must accompany the submission.

5. The deadline for receipt of the submission is June 1, 2008. One copy should be sent to each of the following three judges:

Annual Meeting of European History Section Executive Committee

**Thursday, November 1, 2007 in Richmond, VA
4:30 PM, Executive Board Room, the Richmond Marriott Hotel in Richmond, VA
Minutes**

Present were Georgia Mann, David Hendon, Don McKale, Bob Billinger, Wendy Koenig, Maura Hametz, Joanne Rao Sanchez, Elisabeth Cawthon, and Alice-Catherine Carls. Johnpeter Horst Grill was excused, and so were Brenda Melendy, John Kuykendall, and Frank Buscher. Nancy Rupprecht opened the meeting at 4:30 pm and welcomed the members present.

Reports from Executive Committee Officers

1. Vice Chair Bob Billinger presented his nominations: Rebecca Boehling for the class of 2011 Program Committee; Karl Roeder for the class of 2010 Nominating Committee; Frank Buscher for the class of 2010 Membership Committee; Linda Clark for the class of 2010 Baker-Burton-Smith Committee; Maurice Brungardt for the class of 2010 Parker-Schmitt-Simpson Committee; and Fred Baumgartner for the class of 2010 Snell Committee. Don McKale moved to approve the nominations. Georgia Mann seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

2. Secretary-Treasurer Alice-Catherine Carls presented the Secretary and Treasurer Reports. Elisabeth Cawthon moved approval of both reports. Don McKale seconded. The motion passed unanimously. Based on the success of the 2007 gift giving campaign, which she initiated, Section Chair Nancy Rupprecht commented that the Section could solicit members for gifts every few years. Because of several 2007 presenters' slow response in joining the Section or renewing their dues, it was decided that Elisabeth Cawthon would issue a special dues deadline of February 1, 2008 when notifying presenters whose paper was accepted on the 2008 program.

3. Managing Newsletter Editor David Hendon reported that most members now receive the Newsletter electronically, which results in significant savings. He made a special effort this year to encourage members to send news.

4. SHA Executive Council Representative Don McKale gave detailed news from the Executive Council of SHA. The 2008 New Orleans meeting is scheduled in mid-October from Friday to Sunday. The meeting of the Executive Council will start in the afternoon. The opening day of the 2008 meeting happens to be Yom Kippur. Don McKale is working with John Inscoe, and then will report to Bob Billinger and Joanne Sanchez to make sure that one of the EHS panels is scheduled for the afternoon – so as to avoid disrupting presenters' plans for the holiday. The early 2008 dates helped keep rates down and secure blocks of rooms. The 2009 meeting will be

in Little Rock. Future sites might include Nashville. On other matters, SHA now reaches out to communities, colleges, small 4-year colleges for membership purposes and initiated a program to help provide them with big name speakers or with financial support for research and for presenters' travel expenses. The Executive Council of SHA was positive about our panels, which we work hard to make attractive to non-Europeanists. The Executive Council of SHA is interested in EHS reaching out to foreign scholars and reacted positively to this suggestion made by Secretary Treasurer Alice-Catherine Carls in her report. The biggest change in SHA policy concerns their program. Next year, they will post papers online ahead of time for everyone to read, so that presentations will be short and audience participation increased. Don McKale suggested that we might want to think about this. [Note: in a follow-up meeting of officers of SCBS, LAS, and EHS with John Insoe, SHA announced that it is testing a new way to store online submissions of papers and panels, which might be of interest to EHS as well]. Since an increasing number of presenters need multimedia equipment, Don McKale asked, but that equipment is still very expensive to rent. SHA will set aside money for five multimedia panels and European panels are eligible. He suggested specifying this in instructions to the new program chairs. Wireless use is now possible at no cost in conference hotels.

5. The Enno E. Kraehe Distinguished Service Award was discussed. There are now three names in nomination. The order of the nomination does not matter. Two names were placed in nomination by Bob Billinger. Alice-Catherine Carls seconded the motion, which passed unanimously.

Reports from Standing Committee Chairs

1. Nominating Committee (Brenda Melendy). The 2008 Vice-Chair is James Tent. His retirement in the spring of 2009 is not a problem.

2. Membership Committee (John Kuykendall). Alice-Catherine Carls presented a report of the committee's activities, including progress on the compilation of a master list of institutional contacts, and Frank's timely membership drives, which resulted in a number of new members. Nancy Rupprecht moved that we commend John for his good job on the committee. Her recommendation was approved (no vote needed).

3. Snell Prize Committee (Frank Buscher). Alice-Catherine Carls read Frank's report. The winner of the 2007 John L. Snell Memorial Prize is Carol Dockham, a Master's Degree student at George Mason University, for her paper entitled "Counterrevolutionary in a Cassock: The Trial of Metropolitan Veniamin of Petrograd in 1922" that was written for Professor B. Robert Kreiser's seminar on Trials in History. Next, Frank Buscher's three recommendations were examined. The first two recommendations were approved (deadline change for submission; dialog box in the web-based endorsement). Don McKale suggested to establish a submission date of June 1, 2008 as a pilot date owing to the early conference date, and to eventually leave the submission date up to the current committee chair, perhaps as early as September 15, as suggested by Frank Buscher. No action was taken on the third recommendation to increase the prize money. Don McKale moved to approve the first two recommendations. Georgia Mann seconded and the motion passed unanimously. No action was taken about the third recommendation to increase the monetary value of the prize. Nancy Rupprecht added an overall comment suggesting that the Section define history in a broader way to include fields such as historical geography, historical anthropology, legal history, languages, art, literature, political history, inter-cultural studies, philosophy, intellectual history, without diluting history. She further suggested to send literature and call for papers to various departments and to do this for membership and all ads for papers and prizes. She volunteered to do a write up for the EHS web page. Don McKale moved to expand the pool and to use this new approach to encourage book exhibitors to broaden the pool of books exhibited at the conference, especially crossover books. Elisabeth Cawthon seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

4. Simpson Prize Committee (Astrid Eckert and Donna Graves for Johnpeter Horst Grill). Alice-Catherine Carls presented the problem that had arisen owing to Johnpeter Horst Grill's inability to discharge his duties as committee chair in timely fashion. To insure that a 2007 Simpson Prize would be given, Astrid Eckert and Donna Graves volunteered to extend the deadline for the Prize to the end of the 2007 year, to award the Prize in early 2008, to send the certificate and the check to the winner at this time, and to formally announce the prize recipient at the 2008 Business meeting. David Hendon moved to approve the recommendation. Joanne Sanchez seconded and the motion passed unanimously. Regarding Donna Graves' suggestion to rephrase the committee's duties, it was decided to support this effort and to ask her to submit her recommendations at the 2008 meeting of the Executive Committee.

5. Baker-Burton-Smith Prize Committee (Bob Billinger). Bob Billinger reported that the 2007 winner of the first Baker-Burton Prize is Wendy Lower of Towson University for her book entitled *Nazi Empire-Building and the Holocaust in Ukraine* (Chapel Hill: University of North Carolina Press, 2005). Nancy Rupprecht commended Bob Billinger for taking over the responsibility of chairing the committee after Eric Kurlander recused himself from the committee. It was decided that the Section would give a copy of the winning book to Ukrainian scholar Antony Polonsky at next week's MTSU Holocaust Studies Conference. It was also decided that the committee should notify the presses of the award and invite the publisher to the business luncheon, starting in 2007. [Note: the invitation was extended to UNC editor Charles Grench who was able to attend the luncheon].

6. Program Committee. Maura Hametz, 2007 (Richmond) presented her report. She did an excellent job in keeping everyone in the loop. The 2009 and 2010 chairs could not attend the meeting and sent their regrets. 2008 Program Chair Elisabeth Cawthon reported

about the electronic glitch that caused tense moments (panel and paper proposal forms arrived “empty”), but that was successfully overcome. The 2008 program will put an emphasis on pedagogy, and comparative aspects. She regretted not being able to attend the SHA Program Committee which rescheduled its meeting for Friday without notifying its members. Don McKale graciously accepted to represent her. The good part was that the program has been coming together well and that the committee had worked well together. The submission method was discussed for the 2009 program. The Secretary Treasurer will check into the possibility of setting up a system that will send e-submissions to David Redles (09 Louisville) and to accarls@utm.edu – for double-checking purposes. As for the programs’ submission dates, after some discussion it was decided that there is enough flexibility to leave that decision to the program chair.

Old Business: There was no old business to report.

New Business

1. Nancy Rupprecht reported on the location of the 2008 EHS Reception which will be co-hosted with SCBS in New Orleans and take place at the World War II Museum. Nancy Rupprecht and Jerry Brookshire negotiated a rate of \$ 500 each, with access to the museum’s exhibits. She further stated that SCBS’s association with EHS for the reception will be permanent except every 7 years when SCBS must schedule their reception jointly with the national organization for British Studies. Don McKale suggested that we ask LAS to join in the reception beginning in Louisville. Bob Billinger stated that he would talk to LAS officers on Friday at an informal, informational, scheduled meeting with SHA officials.

2. Alice-Catherine Carls and Nancy Rupprecht introduced a suggestion to change the way in which EHS notifies the Kraehe Award winner. In the past, the recipient’s name has been kept secret. Joanne Sanchez moved that we inform the recipient ahead of time so that he/she may invite family members. The only requirement is that the recipient and other individuals keep the news secret until the award is given. Don McKale seconded, the motion passed unanimously.

3. Astrid Eckert’s suggestion to move the submission date for the Parker-Schmitt entries to the end of the spring semester was discussed. No action was taken.

4. Alice-Catherine Carls entertained the possibility to split the responsibilities of Secretary and Treasurer. The workload is heavy, and the dialogue with members –a very enjoyable but time-consuming part of the Secretary’s responsibilities – could be increased for a tighter networking of the Section. After discussing the issue, Nancy Rupprecht created an ad hoc committee consisting of Joanne Sanchez, Alice-Catherine Carls, and Joel Dark, to work on By Laws change. The idea of a separate webmaster was suggested, as well as the possibility to set up credit card payments. Staggered dates for the terms of Secretary and Treasurer were stressed. The committee will report its conclusions next year.

5. 2008 Mathews-Weinberg Speaker. Bob Billinger has been in touch with Dr. Wagnleitner and will look into asking the Austrian Consulate or Austrian Cultural Affairs Center for financing.

Motion for adjournment was made by Bob Billinger and seconded by Georgia Mann. The committee adjourned at 6:35 pm.
